Dear Chairman Shuster,

We are writing to support passage of the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation (WIIN) Act (S. 612). This legislation includes critical provisions which recognize that without adequate water supplies in California, our nation's largest agricultural state, our food security is at risk.

As you know, California dairy farmers have experienced the worst drought in modern history while also struggling with anemic milk prices caused by weak international markets. California ranks first in U.S. dairy production, producing roughly 20% of the nation's milk in 2015, but drought, environmental, and economic factors are combining to threaten the state's \$7.6 billion dairy farming sector.

California's milk production fell by 3% in 2015, while milk output in much of the rest of the country continued to increase. The drought has increased milk production costs in California, forcing farmers to reduce their herds. This damage follows years of high grain prices, which have boosted production costs in the state and, coupled with volatile milk prices, have greatly eroded farm balance sheets.

Without drought relief and cooperation from the federal government, California's dairy industry is at risk of further damage. We support the common sense provisions included in S. 612 relating to California Water and we urge members to support final passage of this critical legislation.
